Hamilton Bloodhounds Opening Meet 2024

We held our annual Opening Meet here in the village on Sunday 27th October courtesy of the Kerr, Aitchison and Fane families who we hugely appreciate. (Apologies for writing about October - I was supposed to have got this to Clare for the November edition but, with Hettie, four horses and a pack of hounds, time isn't always my friend - sorry Clare!!)

As most of you are far too aware, on 20th October 2023 the heavens opened, and didn't really let up for about six months, which hugely affected our season, cancelling or having to postpone days. We tried to rearrange the meet here last year at least three times, but sadly we never managed to as it constantly seemed to be too wet! So we were over the moon this year when it was actually dry, and sunny. Someone was looking down on us this time!

So with 52 riders (a record for us) and 19 of our bloodhounds, we rode into the village, to the green and the pub for our Opening meet. Our runners had already had a cuddle with the hounds (not a weird fetish, but a must for clean boot hunting so the bloodhounds know which people they are tracking.) The first group of runners had set off on their three mile run across the land between Easton and Hoo, armed with gravy bones to congratulate the hounds when they were found. My horn was blown at 12 noon and off we went onto our first run. The route was littered with new homemade portable jumps for the mounted field to enjoy. We started at Abbey Farm near the river, where the runners had been dropped off. With a loud baying of the hounds, who had sniffed out the runners' scent, away we went. We managed four runs in total that day, a total of $10\frac{1}{2}$ miles, with a port and sausage roll stop halfway - always welcome! At ten to three we finished our last run next to Letheringham Church and with the sun still shining, I blew my horn for home and we walked in. We were greeted with our first 'Bake Off' of the season, where our followers bake delicious treats for us all, and we refresh with a good cup of tea!

It is so special for us to be able to have this showcase meet annually in the village. The support from the village, landowners and local people is always gratefully received. There is something heartwarming about meeting at home, where we have been now for over 150 years, in one form or another. Hopefully by making steps into the future, with support of followers, members, villagers and landowners, it can continue for years to come.

January in the Garden

"There are two seasonal diversions that can ease the bite of any winter. One is the January thaw. The other is the seed catalogues."



With January comes the promise of a new year in the garden and with it all our hopes, dreams, opportunities and excitement of what is to come. Whilst the days begin to get noticeably longer, there are plenty of reasons to get outside.

Jobs for the Kitchen Garden

- Sow broad beans, radishes, onions, leeks, hardy peas, swiss chard, spinach and carrots under cover.
- Nearer the end of the month begin sowing tomatoes and chillies using a propagator or heated mat.
- Chervil, parsley, chives, fennel and coriander can be sown and grown on under cover.
- Cut down autumn fruiting raspberry canes to soil level.
- Cover rhubarb crowns with an upturned bucket for pale, tender stems in the weeks to come.
- Bring potted strawberries under cover for an early crop.
- Harvest leeks, celery, chard, spinach, cabbage, cauliflower, sprouts, kale and parsnips.
- Towards the end of the month begin to chit early seed potatoes.

Jobs for the Ornamental Garden

Now is a great time to sow sweet peas for early flowers and long stems.

Take root cuttings of perennials such as oriental poppies, echinacea, delphinium and phlox.

Keep on top of deadheading violas and pansies for prolonged flowering.

Cut back the old foliage of ornamental grasses to allow the fresh, spring growth through.

Cut back the old top growth of perennials and add to the compost heap.

Remove the leaves from Hellebores so that the flowers are on full view.

January's gardening notes from local horticulturist Nikk Slowey FdSc Hort. who along with her husband Christian are Honeysuckle Horticulture. Nikk is also a lecturer in horticulture at Suffolk Rural.






Poppy Appeal 2024

A Message from Patrick Spencer, MP for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

As we enter the new year, I want to reflect on the first six months since I was elected as your Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich. It is an immense privilege to represent this incredible part of Suffolk, and I have been working hard on your behalf across a range of issues important to us here in Suffolk. From improving access to GPs to addressing rural challenges and supporting our local schools, these past months have been about laying the groundwork and making Central Suffolk and North Ipswich an even better place to live, work and visit.

Improving outcomes for children remains a key focus for me. Over recent months, I've visited local schools, including Suffolk Rural in Otley, Heath Primary School in Kesgrave, Highfields Nursery, and Claydon High School and I will continue to do all that I can to press the need for fairer funding and resources.

Another of my key priorities has been working to improve access to GP appointments. I have held productive meetings with local GP practices, including Needham Market and Cardinal, to understand the challenges they face, as well as meeting with the Integrated Care Board and Government Minister to press for a new GP surgery in North Ipswich. Ensuring that everyone in our constituency has access to the care they need and deserve is vital, and I will continue working closely with healthcare providers and NHS partners to push for long-term solutions.

I have also raised concerns about the Norwich-to-Tilbury pylons, meeting with National Grid and Government Ministers to explore alternatives that would minimise disruption to our beautiful countryside. Flood resilience is still a top priority too, and I meet with the Environment Agency regularly to hold them to account on flood management and mitigation measures. Suffolk's agricultural and rural communities deserve a strong voice in Parliament, and I will continue to advocate for them at every opportunity.

Ensuring the safety of our community is paramount. My recent discussions with police colleagues focused on tackling rural crime, increasing visibility of our hardworking police officers and ensuring that they have the resources to serve effectively. Supporting victims of crime and addressing antisocial behaviour will remain priorities this year.

Our market towns and tourism industry are vital to Suffolk's economy. Over the past months, I have visited a number of local businesses and celebrated initiatives that promote Suffolk as a destination to visit and invest in.

Over the coming year, I will continue to hold regular surgeries across Central Suffolk and North Ipswich, providing a platform for residents to share concerns and receive support with individual problems. Mistletoe and Mistle Thrushes

When the leaves have fallen from the trees, clumps of mistletoe are more easily visible in the branches of trees. This magical plant, with its wishbone leaves and almost translucent berries is a native semi-parasite of deciduous trees, particularly associated with old orchards and parkland.

Mistletoe - Viscum album — favours trees with thinner bark such as poplar,



lime and apple and gains its nutrients partly through photosynthesis and partly from the host tree.



The sticky white berries are a favourite of birds particularly the so-named Mistle thrush. The birds wipe their beaks against the bark of trees to remove the sticky residue or incidentally carry the residue on their feet, so effectively 'planting' the seed in new locations.

Mistle thrushes are so fond of mistletoe berries. that they will often defend a particularly laden tree from other 'would-be' consumers. The hallmark of this defence is the very distinctive rattling call of the Mistle thrush.

Once established, mistletoe is generally long lived and persistent. This is borne out by the fact it was recorded in Parham Letheringham and Framlingham (and therefore likely Easton) in 1562 and is still found in these parishes to today. Sadly, the national population of mistletoe has declined largely due to grubbing out of traditional orchards and unsustainable picking/harvesting as Christmas decorations.

However, Easton is fortunate to have retained a good population, particularly on the parkland limes and the floodplain poplars.



Beware of social media and Google ads for fake holiday sites

Tranquil Garden Pods (formerly known as Star Domes) is peddling a non-existent glamping site by impersonating real holiday homes.

Excited holidaymakers expecting to be 'nestled away in secluded tranquillity in the picturesque countryside of Yorkshire' are instead left cheated and without a holiday.

What's worse, some victims don't discover the accommodation isn't real until they show up at the holiday parks being impersonated in this malicious scam.

Below, we delve into how this scam operates as well as give tips on how to avoid falling victim to holiday fraud.

Fake glamping site



A scam website advertising a non-existent glamping pod holiday. Tranquil Garden Pods has several websites. The scammers seem to launch a new website each time one is taken down.

Which? searched for Tranquil Garden Pods on Google and saw three sponsored search results for the scam company. That means the scammers paid Google for a more prominent listing.

When we clicked on the website, we were offered a '£99 a night November sale' and 'a few days' relaxation' in a pod with 'your own private, elevated decking area'.

On the website, there are several images of the pod, which we traced back to a real UK farm that offers glamping and camping accommodation in the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

We contacted this farm and it told us that it has encountered numerous issues involving Tranquil Garden Pods, with many people who have booked through the scam company showing up at their farm.

Tranquil Garden Pods uses the postcode for a street in North Yorkshire as its location. On this street there are several real private and holiday properties.

'I drove for 45 minutes and arrived to nothing'

People on social media have also reported losing hundreds of pounds. One victim we spoke to lost £99 to the scam, which he first encountered via Google.

'It was a smooth booking process,' he recalls. 'I was sent a receipt and there was a reminder sent before the arrival date.'

'I checked whether the hot tub would be on before arrival and got a response, but when I asked about a gate code and pod number I didn't hear anything,' he told Which?.

He made the 45-minute drive to where he was told the glamping pod was and 'arrived to nothing.' Eventually, he ended up at a legitimate caravan park and was told about the scam by the owner.

Google and scams

Although the sponsored ads that led to the Tranquil Garden Pods' websites are still up, the websites have been taken down. As the scam went by 'Star Domes' previously, it's likely that it will pop up again under a different name.

Avoiding and reporting holiday scams

If you're ready to book a holiday but are suspicious, you should:

- Look out for offers that sound too good to be true.
- Double check the holiday booking's web address, as scammers sometimes create copycat sites with slightly different URLs.
- Check to see when the website was registered on Who.is. If a site is brand new, or has been registered in a different country than it claims to operate in, this can be a red flag.
- Look at reviews across multiple review sites.
- Watch out for fake listings. You can check if images used on listings have been stolen through a reverse image search. To do this on Google, select the image icon on the right of the search bar and upload an image that you've taken a screenshot of from the listing.

If you've been scammed, contact your bank immediately and report the scam to Action Fraud **on 0300 123 2040**.
